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## JTS Programme | The Japan Foundation London

### What is the Japanese Taster for Schools Programme?

The Japanese Taster for Schools (JTS) Programme was created by the Japan Foundation London to build links between schools and Japanese-speaking volunteers. JTS volunteers carry out school visits across the UK to introduce students at any level to the Japanese language, often as part of an International or Japan day. The main purpose of a Japanese Taster is to introduce schools who are not currently teaching Japanese to the language and culture, and to inform them of how to go about introducing the language as an extra-curricular activity or curriculum subject. JTS visits can be arranged to take place at schools around the UK.

#### Who are JTS Volunteers?

Our volunteers are either native/fluent speakers of Japanese, or are currently studying Japanese at university. They will not necessarily have teaching experience or qualifications, but are interested in teaching. The Japan Foundation holds regular training sessions for JTS volunteers, and provides advice and resources for their visits.

## Who benefits from the JTS Programme?



#### Students

## How much will it cost?

Your school must pay the volunteer's transport costs to and from the school. The Japan Foundation will try to find a volunteer as close as possible to your school. If necessary and if agreed by the school and the volunteer, the school should also pay one night's B&B accommodation, e.g. if an early start is required. We encourage schools to offer an additional payment to the volunteer, if they are able to do so. However, this is not a requirement. The school does not need to pay the Japan Foundation any fee.

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### What happens during a JTS Visit?

- **1. Booking:** First, contact us to request a Japanese taster session, or simply complete and send us the application form at the back of this pamphlet.
- **2. Volunteer recruitment:** We will contact our JTS members about the school visit request and identify a suitable volunteer. We will confirm with you that your school is able to pay travel expenses for this volunteer, based on their location.
- **3. Volunteer Contact:** The volunteer will contact you directly to arrange the details of the taster lesson visit, and send you a simple form to confirm the equipment they would like to use. The volunteer will arrange their own transport to be paid for by the school.
- **4. Taster:** The volunteer will then visit your school to deliver the Japanese taster lesson. As the teacher in charge of organising the visit, you will take responsibility for the smooth running of the taster on the day. Please note there must be a classroom teacher present at all times during the taster.
- **5. Follow-up:** After the visit, both you and the volunteer fill out separate evaluation forms and return these to the Japan Foundation, in order to let us know how the visit went and to see what other ways we can support you with Japanese education.

The Japan Foundation provides free regular training days for JTS volunteers, and provides advice and resources for tasters. We also serve as the initial contact point for schools and keep control of all applications. Please note the Japan Foundation cannot take any responsibility for either the arrangement between the Japanese teacher and the school, or the successful delivery of taster sessions.

## JTS - Guidelines for Receiving Volunteers

Please remember that the JTS visitors to your school are volunteers who are **giving up their time without receiving any payment**, and they are not usually trained teachers. In order to make the visit run as smoothly as possible, please take note of the following guidelines. Please ensure that all teachers concerned receive this information and understand the nature of the visit.

#### Pre-visit

- Please ensure the volunteers have clear directions to the school. Where necessary, please provide the volunteers with a map and parking facilities. Please note that the school must cover all travel expenses for all volunteers.
- When contacted by the volunteer in charge of the visit, please discuss the arrangements in details and confirm the time and length of the lessons. Please also check if the school needs to provide any equipment.
- If you need to change arrangements (such as class times, or age group being taught), please make sure the volunteers are informed several days before the day of the visit. Please try to avoid changes to the volunteer's schedule and plans where possible.
- As most of our volunteers are not professional teachers, volunteers should not be required to teach for more than 180 minutes, unless otherwise agreed with the Japan Foundation. Class sizes should be kept as small as possible (we recommend 15-25 students if possible).
- Please be aware that most of our volunteers are not DBS checked, as it is not required by law for individuals volunteering at schools on a short-term basis to have a DBS check.

#### **During the visit**

- The class teacher should manage classroom discipline and control of noise levels at all times. The volunteer should not be left alone with the class. It is not appropriate for class teachers in charge of supervising the session to use the time to do their marking. Additionally, the volunteers greatly welcome class teachers' participation (especially those who can speak Japanese to any extent).
- Please ensure basic classroom equipment such as board markers and an eraser is provided. Please note that many volunteers wish to display a PowerPoint presentation during their session; please make sure the volunteer is fully aware of the IT facilities available to do this. If your school has any policies restricting the use of non-school IT equipment (such as the volunteer's own USB stick), please ensure the volunteer is aware of this well before the session.
- Please assist the volunteers in distributing and collecting any equipment they use in the visits. In particular, specialist equipment such as calligraphy brushes are difficult and expensive to replace, so we welcome your help in ensuring that items do not get damaged or lost.
- Remember that to reach some schools, the volunteers may have travelled quite far. If there is time, a cup of tea/coffee on arrival would be welcomed.
- When classes take place in both the morning and afternoon, please inform the volunteer whether lunch will be provided by the school, or whether they will need to bring their own lunch.

#### **Post-visit**

- If you enjoyed the visit, please let the volunteers know what was good. It is always useful for the volunteers to get feedback, especially as many of them are interested in becoming teachers.
- Please complete the Japan Foundation's Evaluation Form, which will be sent to you after the visit by email, within two weeks of the visit.
- Please contact the Japan Foundation if you would like more information on getting Japanese started at your school, either as a curricular or extra-curricular subject.
- If you would like to stay in contact with the volunteer after the taster, you are welcome to do so independently. Please note that the Japan Foundation do not get involved in subsequent visits or other interactions between the school and the volunteer following the taster session.
